1. Parkland College SWFT

- Free, short-term training program that includes academic and career services.
- Applicants are paid/receive stipend to attend all classes; \$1,600 a semester, or \$150 for Forklift Program. Completing all coursework and an exit interview, enables earning an added \$500.
- Can also receive provide financial assistance to purchase technology, hotspot, assistance for childcare, transportation.
- Courses in Automotive repair (2 semesters), CDL truck driving (4 weeks, 40 hours a week), CNA - nurse assistant (1 semester), EMT (1 semester), Entrepreneurs Basics (2 semesters), Forklift warehouse training (5 days), IT Prep (2 semesters).

5. Parkland Pathway to Illinois:



TRIO Talent Search: Help participants graduate from high school, enroll in college the fall after graduating high school or completing an equivalent program (e.g., GED), and complete their postsecondary education.

TRIO Upward Bound: Career and major exploration, college visits, academic support in high school

TRIO Student Support Services: Encourage students to pursue academic excellence, persist in their collegiate studies and earn their degrees

TRIO McNair Scholars: Prepare participants to be the next generation of scientists, researchers, and professors through rigorous graduate school preparation, academic development, and research training.
